Earlier this summer Kathy and I went to see *Toy Story 3* thinking this would be a light, fun movie to see while Hannah and Thomas were off doing other things. Of course, if you've seen it, you know it's about Andy going off to college (a little "too close to home" for us). Andy . . . who has been with us through all the toy story movies, the boy we've watched grow up is leaving home. As he prepares to go to college he cleans out his room and packs himself (this part was clearly *fiction!*) and then has to make decisions about which toys to store in the attic, give away, or worst of all - throw away! This puts Woody, Buzz Lightyear, Rex the paranoid dinosaur, Mr. and Mrs. Potato Head and all the rest into a panic and on to another adventure.

The movie forces you to think about transition and change. The toys are on a search for a place to be safe and secure (not thrown away). Andy is in the midst of those hard decisions of which things to keep, which to let go. In the end, all the characters end up discovering (or re-discovering) some core issues. For the toys, is it most important to be "kept" or is their major purpose and joy to "be played with?" For Andy, the question is whether he will keep the toys (hoard them in the attic), or give them to another kid who will find joy in them?

Obviously, the film touches the core of what the Schorr family is experiencing right now, but all of us deal with the constant transitions of life. As followers of Christ, we are, or should be aware, that "following" means a journey and that we are continually being changed so that we become more and more like Christ. All of us are aware of what Phyllis Tickle describes as a "monumental phenomenon in our world called the "Great Emergence." Like every "new season" (the world has gone through many such shifts before) it affects every part of our lives: social, cultural, intellectual, political, economic, and spiritual.

So this fall, we launch into a sermon series attempting what the characters in the movie did - explore the core so that we might live more authentically as Christ followers with less fear. It involves "inside out" living, where we search out our true identity and live with character and the priorities of Christ. It involves obedience where we live with true purpose and true joy that impacts the lives of others around.

Plan to be a part of what God is doing in us and through us!

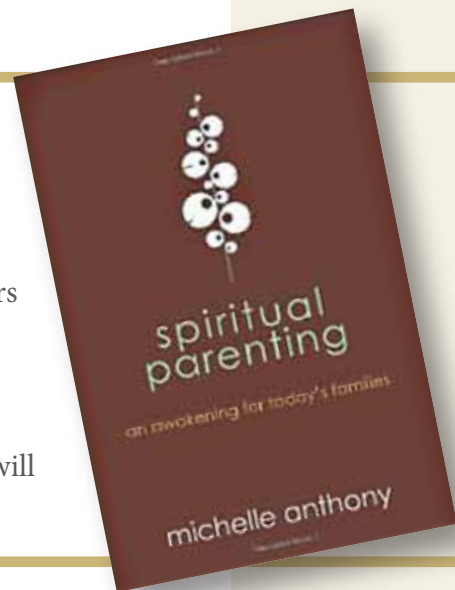

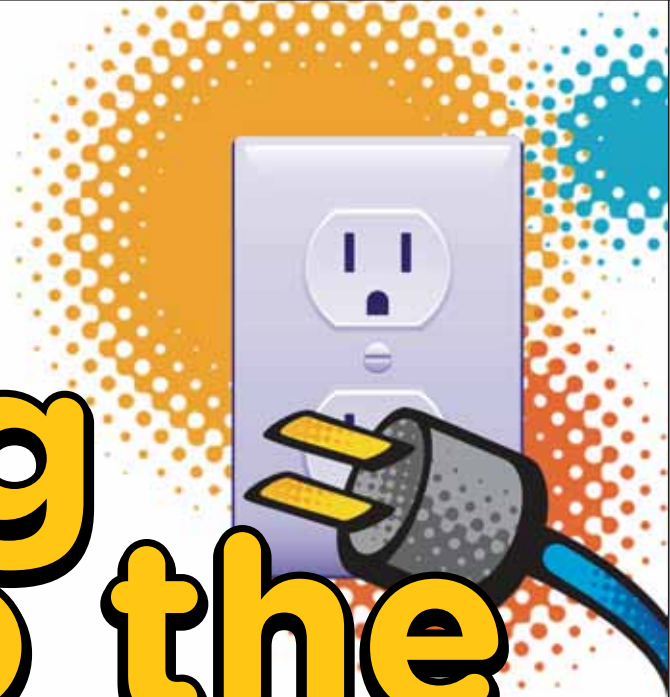

Loved Enough

Sidda: *Daddy, did you get loved enough?*

Shep: *What's enough? My question is, did you?*

I caught this dialog in the middle of *Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood* and it has stuck with me, worked at me, and shaped me poco a poco. I hardly noticed how much this simple question troubles us all until I sat down and tried to answer it. The easy answer is, "Sure, I think so" but it's that "I think so" lingering at the end that causes me to pause. In the movie, Shep, who had endured a long, stormy, and seemingly loveless marriage with Sidda's mother, wonders what enough is and I do too. As if that weren't enough of an unanswerable query, I began to ask if I myself had loved enough. And that is where I began writing today.

Anyone who has seen the *paparazzo* swarming around the rich and famous knows it is possible to be loved too much, but, to be loved enough is a much more subtle distinction. One might say that a stranger would be unable to love you enough but then you might remember help with a flat tire, a kind word standing in line, or coming home to find that the contractor you hired really cared about doing a good job. I would say in each instance that though they were strangers you would feel loved enough that day. I am often surprised at the simple things that cause people to become friends. If you have a good friend I imagine it's because once, probably when they weren't even aware of it, they loved you enough.

The apostle Paul described love for us in his letter to the Corinthians: *Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.* The interesting thing is that the love Paul describes is not the love that is clamored for by our culture or sold to us in endless ads. The love Paul describes can be, and often is, unnoticed but beautiful, tender but powerful, patient but insistent, bearable, believable, and hopeful. When I feel loved enough, this is the love I have received.

The summer I knew that God was bringing Kerry and me to Midland, Texas I wrote a song I am only now beginning to understand. It's called *I Am Standing by the Sea*. I had been reading the account at the end of the book of John where Jesus really leans into Peter and asks him to feed his sheep. Looking through Peter's eyes I wrote these words:

*When I was a younger man
A life of ease, I walked where I pleased; now I follow you, follow you
I am standing by the Sea
And you look at me, right through me . . . feed my sheep, feed my sheep*

More and more, as I look out on a sea of pump-jacks and red dirt, I realize that being loved enough and loving enough are two sides of the same coin. There is not one without the other. Jesus is telling Peter and us that in order for us to feel loved enough we have to extend enough love just like the Good Samaritan or the father of the Prodigal Son. When we do we, in turn, will feel loved enough. Jesus is instructing us to love our way through a difficult work situation, an ungrateful child, people that cut in line in front of us, people who don't dress well enough to suit us, or those who failed to attend the right school. If we can't love enough then we will never feel loved enough. This is the simple reality of the One who was beaten, spat upon, scourged, and shoved down a rough street to a certain and painful execution. He hung on a cross, looked down and loved enough to save us.

Near the end of *Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood*, Shep's difficult wife comes to him seeking his love and offering her own. In that moment Shep looks like a man who is loved enough and he might say to us, "If you want to be loved enough then love enough."

They are currently in need of regular sized hygiene items such as lotions, unisex deodorant and especially shampoo and conditioner. No individual or hotel size items please. Underwear and socks for women and children of all ages are also needed. Other needs are over the counter medications including ibuprophen, cough drops, cough, cold and flu medications. Always indemand are baby items such as diapers (especially sizes 4, 5 and 6), wipes, baby shampoo, lotion and diaper rash ointment. No clothing donations or pull-up diapers are needed. A large donation tub will be conveniently located at the reception desk entrance of the church and a small tub will be located at the nursery entrance throughout the month of September.

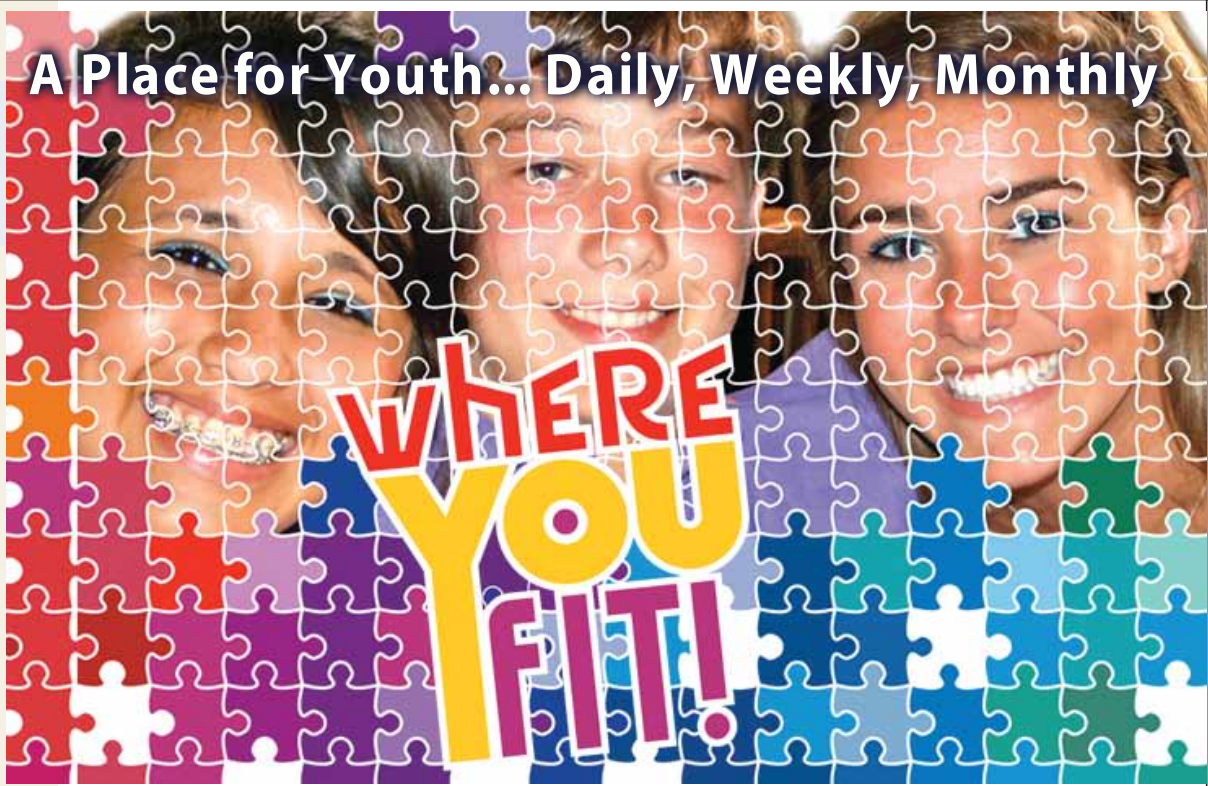
Historical Sightseeing trip to Stanton
